MEET OUR NEW VILLAGE PRESIDENT

Hello. I was asked to introduce myself. I am Bernie Samz, President of the Village of Mishicot. I was elected in April 2007 with two new trustee members, John Franz and Mark Rabas.



We join Don Haack, Tony Marcelle, Melvin Kliment, and Alan Beranek on the Village Board. Before I was elected Village President, I served as trustee on the Board for six years. I was born and raised in Mishicot, moved to Two Rivers for a few years, and now have been living here for over fifteen years with my wife, Debbie, and our two children, Kayla and Mitchell.

As your President, I see new changes ahead for our Village. The Riverwalk Committee is working on plans to expand Riverwalk to the east, which would continue along the river and hook up with the east end of Church Street. A project to blacktop the VFW Vets Park driveway and parking lot is in the works. Engineers are working on the plans and bids will be received around the end of September. Finally, there is the waste water system project that is underway. The project will include upgrading and expanding sewage lift station No. 1, construction of the sewage lift station support building, and the construction of the wastewater conveyance system that will discharge to the City of Two Rivers. The estimated cost is \$4,127,000, with the Village cost share estimated at \$3,817,000 and the City of Two Rivers cost share estimated at \$310,000.

As a reminder, our regular Village Board meetings are the first and third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 PM in the Village office and are open to the public. Hope to see you there.

AGAIN SUMMER CONCERTS A SUCCESS

While this year’s concerts are still fresh in everyone’s memory plans are underway for the next summer series. A number of the bands will be back and the rest will be new. The Newtonburg Brass Band has already made a commitment to play here on July 19. The concerts have developed a large following including many from Manitowoc, Two Rivers and our Fox Hill guests. According to the Maritime Museum of Manitowoc, a wooden schooner 67 ft. long was built in the Manitowoc ship yards in 1882 by George Jorgensen and was called the Mishicot. Records show that it sailed the great lakes until 1912 when it went aground in South Haven, lower Michigan. We are hoping to secure a photo of it for our museum.

MISHICOT YESTERYEARS-THE DANIEL SMITH FAMILY *continued*

Recent research has produced more interesting information and photos of the Daniel Smith family. In this issue we will share them with you. Our May newsletter featured photos of what we believe to be the Daniel Smith house. Below right is one recently obtained, taken around 1895. Dr. J.B. Rick purchased the house from the Smith Family around 1890 and started his medical practice in the home. Dr. Rick and his daughters, Ruth and Elsie, (1884-1964) are on the front porch. This is the earliest picture that we have of the house, which originally was along the river near the present day barber shop.

Daniel (1801-1858) and Elizabeth Puffer Smith (1803-1882) had 9 children. (1) Mary Ann (1822-1844) was the first burial in our cemetery, (2) Amanda (1824-1837) died and was buried in Buffalo N.Y. and (3) Melissa (1828-1845) was probably the second burial here in Mishicot.

This left six children; three sons, 1st, Alfred (1825-1880) the oldest boy who followed in his fathers' work as a lumberman and who helped build the mill in Mishicot in 1844 and the second one two years later a mile west on highway 147. He had help from Ira Clark, who himself built a mill in the hamlet named after him, Clarks Mill.

Alfred married Minnie Landsworthy from DePere. His oldest son was named Rockway. In honor of his first grandchild, Daniel named our Rockway street after him. Alfred died in Neenah of dryrot in 1880 and supposedly, according to his obituary, is buried in the family plot here, but there is no marker for him. The second son was Ira P. (1832-1904) who was married, ran a store in our village for a while and was sheriff of the county from 1862-63. He had three children -two daughters and a son, Ira J. who spoke at Mishicot's centennial in 1947. Ira asked to be buried with his parents in our cemetery. His other family members rest in Evergreen Cemetery in Manitowoc. The 3rd son was Lafayette, (1835-1906) who was one of the first from the area to enlist for the civil war. After the war, he lived in Minneapolis, was married, had a family but separated from them and they are not mentioned anywhere. Later he lived at King Veterans Home and for his last two years came back to Mishicot and rented a room at the Opera House. He died there and his military funeral was there. He too is buried in the family plot and has a civil war marker.

The three remaining daughters were Jeanette Smith Eams (1831-1914) who married Frank Eams and lived in Spring Green & Elkorn. They had two sons who lived beyond childhood, Frank Jr. who became editor of the Elkorn newspaper and Albert, who went to the Hawaiian Islands and started the pineapple plantations which, with time, became the Dole Pineapple Co. He died in Hawaii in 1914, but is buried in Oakland, CA.

The three of them are pictured below left. This is the only photo besides Elizabeth that we presently have of the family. Jeannette was the last of the family to die.

Clementine Smith VanValkenburgh (1837-1880) was married in Mishicot in 1855 to B..J. He was an officer in the civil war and was the 1st superintendent of schools for the county. They moved to La Crosse, had 4 children, the oldest son was named Daniel Smith died in Houston Texas. Clementine died in 1880 and is buried in La Crosse. Her husband remarried and lived in Austin, MN. but is buried next to Clementine. Elizabeth Smith Goodwin. (1842-1898) was two when the family came to Mishicot. She went to school in Two Rivers, Mishicot, and Racine, where she became a teacher. She married Benjamin F. Goodwin in Milwaukee. Goodwin School and Goodwin Road here in the county are named after him. They moved to La Crosse and then to Winnebago City, MN. where they had three children. Elizabeth and Benjamin are buried there.

RIVERWALK COMMITTEE

The Village of Mishicot Riverwalk Committee is pursuing the extension of the existing Riverwalk east of the Village Park along the East Twin River, ending at the east end of East Church Street. The current vision is that path will be crushed limestone and include a two to three benches along the way. There has also been discussion regarding a bridge crossing the river near the High School. An engineering firm will be surveying the route this fall and preparing a proposal for a State grant that must be submitted by May 1, 2008. If all goes well, the new walk will be completed in the spring of 2009.

There had been discussion of constructing a walk from Highway B near the bridge along the river to Vets Park. The considerable amount of wetland along this route, however, would require an extensive length to be constructed of costly wooden boardwalk. The expense, including increased maintenance costs, and the sense that this walk would not get as much use as other alternatives, resulted in this option being dropped.

CHRISTMAS AT THE MUSEUM

While the holidays may seem a long way off, plans are underway for our annual Christmas at the Museum.

The George Schmidt collection of antique ornaments and lights will be available for this fourth annual event which drew nearly 700 people last year. George Schmidt died in April but arrangements were made to continue using the collection. Last year 14 different groups provided special Christmas music while the Friends of the Museum provided hot cider and cookies. This year we have already had interest expressed by the Z Brass, made up of people with Mishicot connections and Jim VanLanen, violinist with Maniowoc County Sympathy. We hope this year to publish a program listing all the groups ahead of time. The scheduled times for the event are December 18-19, 26-27, and January 4-5. Again this year will be a special night on December 17 for all the area business people and a matinee on Saturday January 5.

NEW LIFE IN DOWNTOWN MISHICOT

A number of Mishicot businesses, and individuals have made improvements to their properties this summer and are worth acknowledging. They are important steps towards our revitalization of Mishicot. New signs were added at Chillers' Pub, MT Cup Coffee Shop, Shear America, Sweet Creams, the May Tag Laundry and the Subway Shop. New facades were also done at MT Cup, Chillers Pub and Mishicot Subway. MAGIC design committee coordinated the new Mishicot Cemetery sign. The committee also placed 3 more old whiskey barrels, added two more hitching posts, and placed five old wagon wheels as part of the turn of the century theme for the village. We are grateful to Rick Hartel for donating the wheels. MAGIC, this summer, replaced four old rotting planters with new half whiskey barrels, A new flower planter was also added at the corner of Church and State Streets. Eight old-style solar lamps and the two major flower beds were added as well as at the band concert location. Duane Jerabek coordinated that project. Much of these projects were funded from the profit of the alumni collection and the used book sale sponsored by the Design Committee on rummage sale weekend. Additionally, PK Auto and Mishicot Dry Cleaners have done exterior painting to their businesses.

Thanks to all involved as we look forward to continued improvements in the appearance of our historic downtown. Our visitors often comment on our beautiful village and return because of all these efforts. The cooperation and efforts of all is important to the continued success of MAGICs' efforts.
