Memorial Day Parade and Program

The annual Memorial Day Parade and program will be held on Monday, May 26. The Parade begins at 12:00 noon at the high school. The Mishicot High School Band, under the direction of Mr. Colin Baird will provide music. After the program, the VFW auxiliary will serve lunch in the Vets Park Club House. Museum to Host Open House on Memorial Day

Our Mishicot Historical Museum will hold an Open House on Memorial Day, Monday, from 2 to 4 pm. The museum had its first open house last Memorial Day in honor of George Schmidt who died in April of 2007. Many new things have been added this spring to the museum: the floors have been refurbished, carpeting has been added, new displays erected and shades are being installed. Memorial day begins the 2008 season for the museum and commemorates its 20th year of operation. Coffee and cake will be served by the Friends of the Museum. The museum is also encouraging participation in its boardwalk memorial that extends around the museum. Names are engraved on the boards and the cost of \$50 is used to help support the museum. The renovation of the cupola on the museum will take place this summer. Powwow Trip – June 21

Saturday, June 21, is the date for the 3rd annual Mishicot bus trip to the Land of Chief Mishicott of the Hannahville Potawatomi in Harris, MI. sponsored by our museum. The day begins with coffee and donuts at 8 am at The Old School at 315 Elizabeth St.. The coach bus leaves from the Old School at 8:30 am and returns at approximately 8:30 pm. Register at Village Hall 511 E Main St., where a complete itinerary of the day is available or call 755-2525 to register. Again this year, tribe Cultural Director and great grand son of Chief Mishicott, Earl Meshiguad will be our guide. We will visit Chief Mishicott's grave and have a tour of the

sweat lodge at Earls' home. Indian craft vendors and food will be available. Due to the cost of gas, the fee for the trip has been raised to \$35, which covers bus fare and admission to the Powwow. On the return trip, we'll stop for supper at Schloegel's Restaurant in Menominee, MI.; cost of which will be the responsibility of the participants.. We need a minimum of 33 people to pay for the trip. 92 people have gone in the past and had a lot praise for the trip. This trip is part of Mishicot's ongoing relationship with the Potawatomi and the respect for the chief for whom our village is named after. Visit our museum for more information.

Sound System - MAGIC has purchased a used sound system to be used at village events. It was used for the first time in April at the canoe/kayak event and will be used at the Memorial Day Program & summer concerts.

Covered Bridge Lighting - Additional lighting in the covered bridge was recently added by MAGIC to increase security and enhance the beauty of this historic bridge. The original bridge was probably built of wood about the time the brewery began, around 1865. The present cement bridge was built in 1924 and was covered in 1997.

Village Park Shelter – Plans are progressing for phase I of improvements to our village park shelter building, including a larger sink and updated electrical receptacles, etc. The \$5,300 cost of these improvements will be paid with profits from the Riverfest event. COMING UP - MORE FUN ALONG THE RIVER – RIVERFEST IN JULY

You can't tell it by the weather, but summer and our 11th annual Riverfest are just around the corner. Most of the major pieces are in place, with a few items and surprises left to finalize.

Thursday kicks off with spectacular fireworks at dusk.

On the live music front, "Haze", doing the best in 70s and 80s classic rock will take the stage on Thursday at 7:00 p.m. On Friday, "The Del Rays" perform 50's DooWop music at the Family Stage, beginning at 4:30, followed by Wisconsin's Rockinest Band "Road Trip" in the Mega Tent at 8:00 p.m. Saturday night's headliner is "Light Up" tribute to Styx, still the finest tribute in the Midwest. On Sunday, it's "The Mardscek Brothers Band" with polka power direct from the Polka Capital of the World, Pulaski, WI.

For our pull track enthusiasts, we will welcome draught (work) horse pulls on Thursday at 6:00 pm, roaring 4x4 truck pulls on Friday at 4:30 pm, lawn tractors at 11:00 am, farm tractors at 1:00 pm and more 4x4 truck pulls on Saturday. On Sunday at 1:00 pm, it's a new event for Riverfest as F.A.A.R.M. presents antique tractor pulls along with our antique farm machinery show.

Spectrum Entertainment Carnival will be on the grounds all week with rides, games and concessions.

Other events of note include our famous fish boil on Friday at 4:00 pm, chicken dinner on Saturday at 4:00 pm, The Mishicot Car Club Car Show on Saturday at 10:00 am, the Gigantic Riverfest Parade, featuring Miss Wisconsin at 11:30 am along with Mighty East Twin Duck Race at 3:00 pm.

MISHICOT'S YESTERYEARS

Remembering the Saxonburg Cheese Factory _____

The Saxonburg Cheese Factory stands as a reminder of the many such factories that were located in the Mishicot area in the early part of this century.



The building still stands just east of Mishicot. A short drive to the top of Saxonburg Hill will give you the opportunity to see what an old-time cheese factory looks like from the outside. At the top of the hill, look to the right and you will see the white building with the cupola on top. The factory was started by Charles Mueller at some time between 1890 and 1900. It was also owned by August Febarrmann and William Stoneman, but in 1907 it was sold to 18 farmers and then became the Saxonburg Co-op Dairy. Total selling price at that time for the house, factory and machinery was \$3,600. In the early years, mostly butter as made, which sold for 26 cents per pound in 1910. At that time, cheese sold for only 14 cent per pound. The last names of the cheesemakers, who supervised the cheesemaking were Glover, Princl, Sensing, Beeck, Princl (a second time) Hiddie, Zermuehlen, Preator and Denor. In 1961 the co-op merged with the Lake to Lake Dairy.

This is an excerpt from an article which first appeared in the August, 1988 edition of Magic's Newsletter, information was collected by Dora Kadow in an interview with Paul Mueller.

Did You Know? _____

That Mishicot became incorporated as a village on August 23, 1950. Hugo Holst was the first Village President. The Village Board continued to meet in what is now the museum until 1976 when the village purchased the old bank building at 442 E. Main Street as its Village Hall. The population of the village and the town combined in 1950 was 1,746. In 1960, when the census was taken again, the population of the village alone was 762.

Voices of the Past: Local History Class _____

The Social Studies Department at Mishicot High School is glad to see there is enough student interest to have a second year of our Voices of the Past: Local History Class. We will continue to tap into our community resources for weekly speakers, oral history participants, as well as our first year for a Mishicot Hall of Fame induction.

- The completion of a local history timeline of events including key events in the history of Mishicot as well the Potawatomi (nation of Chief Mishicot) to be displayed in a hallway in the high school.
- We will continue our work with the Mishicot Public Museum by updating our photo archive collection and oral history interviews on our website www.mishicotmuseum.com.
- We will also continue our work with revising the Mishicot Meaningful Memories book that was created in the 1980s by the elementary school.

As you can see, we plan to keep ourselves busy over the next few weeks. Voices of the Past Local History class will be back for the third year next fall and will be busy planning the 50th Anniversary of the High School celebration to take place in conjunction with the Homecoming Festivities. Thank you for your support and willingness to help our students become the keepers of the history of the Village of Mishicot.
