Pumpkin Carving/Decorating:

Carving and decorating of real pumpkins will be judged in four age groups.

Division 1: Kindergarten and younger

Division 2: First through fourth grade

Division 3: Fifth through eighth grade

Division 4: Ninth through adult

Rules: This year's contest features a Disney theme. Registration takes place between 8:30 and 9 a.m. on Saturday, October 17th at the Mishicot Fire Station. Pumpkins are judged on originality, uniqueness, quality, and overall appearance. The top three in each division will win a cash prize. Judging begins at 9:15 a.m. on Saturday.

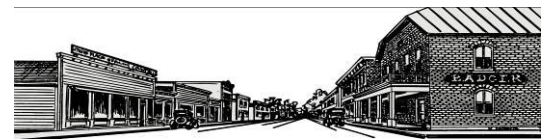
Pies & all other variety of pumpkin goodies

Farmers' Market Continues _____

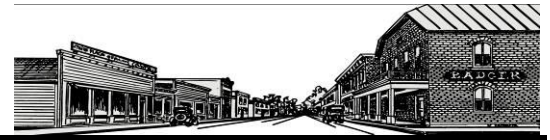

Shoo the Flu _____

A nurse will be on hand on October 21 From 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. The cost is \$30 for a Flu Shot and \$45 for a Pneumonia Shot. Cash and checks only accepted as payment, as well as Medicare Part B and Medicare replacement plans and Medicaid (T-19, Badger Care). Nine year olds and older can receive a shot. A parent or guardian must be present with any child under 18 years of age.

Village News Briefs

Improvements to Concession Stand

If you attended Riverfest or a ball game at the Village Park recently, you may have noticed that the concession stand was updated with many improvements this past year. The dark wall paneling was removed and new white milk board panels were installed. Sixteen 20-amp outlets were installed around the perimeter of the building along with six 20-amp plug-in ceiling drop cords. New insulated entry doors, an insulated garage door, insulated vinyl windows, and a roll-up serving window were installed. The old wash sink was replaced with a used 3-compartment stainless steel sink. A Manitowoc icemaker, two Manitowoc coolers, an upright freezer, and a used electric stove were installed. The old counter was removed and four new tables were provided. The restrooms were upgraded with new fluorescent light fixtures and were repainted.

MAGIC donated \$5,100 and Riverfest donated \$1,500 toward the project. Jerry Kadow donated the 3-compartment sink and the installation labor. Manitowoc Company donated the icemaker and a partial donation of the coolers. Brian Wegner donated the balance of the large Manitowoc stainless steel cooler. John Sprang Renovation did the construction work with a partial labor donation. Mark Koeppel did the electrical work with a partial labor donation. Brian Reif donated the freezer. Al Beranek and Mel Kliment donated the stove. Dan Zipperer donated the labor to paint the entry doors. The Mishicot Lions Club donated the tables. The Village maintenance personal and Al Beranek helped with the work.

The Village Park Concession Stand can be rented for various private functions. To rent the park, contact Melvin Kliment, Village Parks Chairman, at 755-4032.

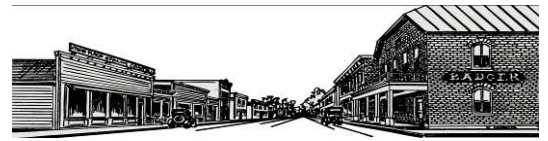

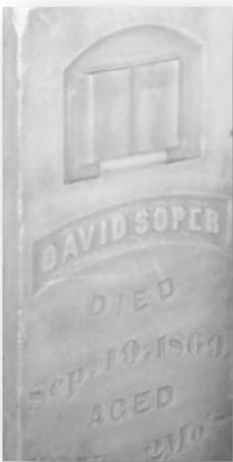
HISTORY DETECTIVE

The National Public Television Network series "History Detective" (Mondays at 7 p.m.) provides the inspiration for this article.

Mishicot has plenty of interesting history stories, many which are mysterious. Some, through research, can and have been solved. Here are several Mishicot mysteries:

Solved

No 1:



In 1964, a tombstone was found under the old Holst Store when the store was dismantled. The engraving on the stone said "David Soper died 1869" The stone, thanks to Paul Burdick, who had it at his home for 40 some years, is now outside of our museum. When found, no one knew who Soper was, where he was buried, or how the stone happens to be where it was found. Two years ago, through research at the Manitowoc Library, we located information on the Soper family, which revealed that Soper lived in the Clarks Mill-Cato area. He died in 1868, not 1869 and is buried in a small cemetery a few hundred yards northeast of the bridge in Clarks Mill in a grave a stone's throw from the grave of Ira Clark, for whom the village of Clarks Mill is named. We know that Ira was a friend of Daniel Smiths' oldest son, Alfred, and they worked together on building the mills in Mishicot. The reason the stone was discarded was because the date of David Soper's death inscribed on it, was off by a year of his actual death. How the stone got to Mishicot is a still mystery. Could Ira Clark have brought it here on one of his trips to Mishicot? Could C. A. Holst, the founder of that store brought it here when he passed through the Clarks Mill area from Potter to Mishicot in the late 1880s? We don't know, but we can speculate. By the way, David Soper had four sons, all of whom served in the Civil War; sadly three of them never returned. The flowers planted in front of his stone at the museum are a silent memorial to them.

No. 2:

In 1970, a skeleton was found in a flower bed next to Lloyd Brouchoud's house at 411 Elizabeth Street. That house was built in 1904 by Dr. Karnopp and served both as a hospital and clinic in the village. So how did that skeleton get there and whose was it? Investigation by the sheriffs' department found that the skeleton belonged to Dr. C. J. Skwor and was a medical model used in his office in that house. It seems that sometime after his death, his wife buried it there to get dispose of it.



HISTORY DETECTIVE *continued.....*

Unsolved _____

No. 1:

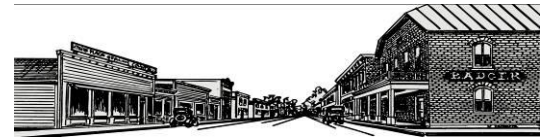
In 1880, Alfred Smith, the oldest son of Daniel, mentioned above, died in Neenah from 'dry-rot' (today we call that gangrene.) His obituary says his body was going to be returned to Mishicot to be buried in the family plot. Yet there is no marker. So.... are his remains here or not? Maybe investigation on where his wife is buried will give a clue. Or could the marker have sunk into the ground? Or did it rot away?

No 2:

Here's another unsolved Mishicot mystery. In the 1870's meeting minutes for the Town of Mishicot (the village was not incorporated until 1950), entries are found that show the town paid a Mr. Bagniet about \$3 monthly to care for a "Mrs. Mishicott" at the Mishicot Poor House. (Mishicot built its own poor house to take care of those who could not care for themselves.) It was built in 1870 and still stands at 419 Randolph Street. Later he was paid \$7 for a casket to bury her. Soooo..... Who was Mrs. Mishicott? Investigation with the Potawatomi says their chiefs could have had up to four wives. So did one of them stay in Mishicot after the chief left this area in 1862? It seems possible. And where was she buried? Probably in the village cemetery in a part that was often called potters field.

The research center in our museum is intended to help discover these interesting stories and provide clues to the unsolved mysteries. We frequently receive and appreciate donations of information and documentation. The collection continues to grow and evolve.

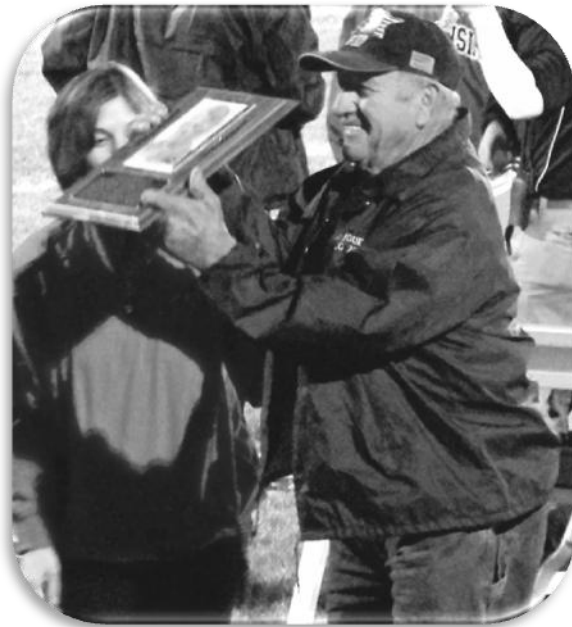


More Mishicot News

Mishicot Hall of Fame

Tradition helps to build school pride and a positive atmosphere in a school. Mishicot has embarked on continuing to build this school pride by introducing a Hall of Fame to the school. Every other year this prestigious award will be presented to up to three outstanding citizens.

Applications are currently being accepted for this highest honor that can be granted to a Mishicot High School Alumni or community member. There are three nomination categories: Community Service -- is given to someone who has or continues to work hard for the benefit of the whole school community; Professional Contributions -- is given to someone who has gone beyond the expectations in his or her chosen profession and works to improve the lives of others as well; Exceptional Talent is given to someone who has given back to the community by using his or her talent in the arts or sports.



Richard Heyroth accepts the Mishicot Hall of Fame Community Service Award on behalf of his late wife, Jeannette.

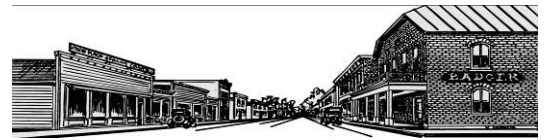
Our first inductees were Jeannette Heyroth who received the Community Service Award for her contributions to village life using the Herald Times to write on many events in Mishicot and her contribution to the creation of MAGIC. Hazel Eisenmann was our first inductee for Professional Development. She has contributed 40 years working tirelessly for the School District, setting up the MECCA trail as well as the outdoor classroom. Our last inductee was Cindy Bremser for Exceptional Talent who was a pioneer for women's sports in our state and nation.

If you feel you know a worthy graduate or a community member of Mishicot who meets these high standards, we invite you to complete the nomination form and return it to the Mishicot High School Hall of Fame Committee for consideration. Successful nominees will be honored during a special ceremony where they will receive an award. If in the past you have nominated someone but they were not inducted, their application will be kept for consideration for three rounds. You may continue to add to their contributions at any time. If after three times they were not successful, their name will be removed until someone nominates them again.
